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## PROGRAM NOTES

**Ain-a That Good News!** This is a traditional spiritual which, as one writer said of it, “makes the present bearable.” Songs like this were sung and passed along by slaves as a way of coping with the trials and difficulties of life. The arranger, Victor C. Johnson, is a native of Dallas and has over 350 compositions in print. He currently serves as Minister of Worship and Arts at Shiloh Baptist Church in Plano, Texas.

**All Praise to Thee.** Martin Luther’s Christmas text from 1524 is given an original melody by Elaine Hagenberg, one of the most popular choral composers of our day. She is known for writing beautiful melodies with rich harmony.

**What Sweeter Music.** This carol by poet-priest Robert Herrick (1591-1674) was first published in *His Noble Numbers: or, His Pious Pieces* (1647) with six stanzas and three sections labeled as choruses. Herrick served a parish in Dean Prior, Devonshire, for about twenty years before being forced into retirement on account of his loyalty to King Charles I. The original music written for this text has been lost. John Rutter’s memorable melody and arrangement was written in 1988.

**Jesus, Priceless Treasure.** *Jesu meine Freude (Jesus, my Joy)* is a choral motet by Johann Sebastian Bach. In its entirety, it has eleven movements. The odd numbered movements are stanzas of the Lutheran hymn “Jesus, Priceless Treasure” (TLH 347). These are the ones presented here. The even-numbered movements are settings of texts from Romans 8.

**Come to Jesus.** Chris Rice (b. 1962 in Clinton, MD) did not originally intend to have a career in music. However, he frequently led church youth events and ended up writing songs and performing on the guitar. Since 2007 he has pursued other interests as well, including photography and painting.

**Let All Things Now Living.** Katherine K. Davis (1892-1980) is best known for writing the Christmas song “The Little Drummer Boy,” but her Thanksgiving lyrics and arrangement of the Welsh folk tune ASH GROVE combine here to form an outstanding classic hymn.

**God Bless America.** This familiar patriotic song was originally written in 1918 by Irving Berlin (1888-1989) but was revised in 1938 and then made famous by singer Kate Smith on her radio show.

**Sheep May Safely Graze.** This piece was originally written as a soprano solo in one of Bach’s secular cantatas (No. 208 “The ‘Hunt’”). James Winfield has arranged it for four-part choir and given it a more religious text based on Psalm 23. It is frequently played at weddings and other special occasions.

**Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven.** Henry F. Lyte is most famous for his hymn *Abide with Me, Fast Falls the Eventide*, but he wrote other favorites as well, including this one. The music is by the 19<sup>th</sup> century English organist and composer John Goss, who also wrote the Christmas tune for *See, Amid the Winter’s Snow*.

**The Lord Bless You and Keep You.** Peter Lutkin (1858-1931) was a professor of music at Northwestern University in Evanston, IL. He was also an accomplished

organist who helped found the American Guild of Organists in 1896 (an organization still operating today). This benediction is his best known work and is sung by countless church choirs throughout the world.

Lord Make Me To Know. 2023 marked the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the death of William Byrd (1540-1623), one of the greatest English composers of the Renaissance. He is known for his madrigals, motets, and settings of liturgical music.

If Ye Love Me. Besides William Byrd, the other premier Renaissance composer is Thomas Tallis (1505-1585), Byrd's teacher. He is known for writing a piece for 40-part choir, *Spem in alium*, considered a unique monument in English music. Listen for the polyphony in Tallis' music, each voice singing its own melody simultaneously.

The Peace of God. Richard Horn (1938-2004) was a church musician and composer from Rochester, NY. At the age of 12 he was appointed assistant organist at his uncle's church in Philadelphia. He had a 54 year career in church music. His last 16 years were spent as music director of St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Madison, WI.

All Things Work Together for Good. John Carter (b. 1930) is Director of Music at University Baptist Church, Columbus, OH. He is a well-known composer with several hundred choral compositions to his credit as well as several musicals, an opera, and a dozen collections for keyboard and organ. This piece is his best-known and best-selling work.

Amazing Grace. John Newton (1725-1807) was an English clergyman and poet. He was a former slave trader who converted to Christianity while reading the Bible on the slave ship where he worked. Other Newton hymns include *How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds* and *Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken*.

Soon and Very Soon. Andraé Edward Crouch (1942-2015) was born in San Francisco and raised in Los Angeles. He began playing music in church at the age of 11 when his father was called as a guest preacher to a small rural church that had no musicians. He wrote his first gospel song at 14. *Soon and Very Soon* (1976) is his best known work and joyfully anticipates Jesus' second coming.

How Lovely Is Thy Dwelling Place. This beloved choral work is the fourth movement from Brahms' *German Requiem*. Written between 1865 and 1868, it may have been composed in response to the death of his mother. In contrast to the traditional Roman Catholic requiem text, Brahms wrote his own libretto based on Luther's German Bible.

I Will Rise. Chris Tomlin (b. 1972) is a Christian singer/songwriter. A native of Texas, he holds a bachelor's degree in psychology from Texas A&M. His records have sold over 7 million copies. *Time* magazine has called him the "most often sung artist anywhere."

Go My Children. American Jaroslav Vajda (1919-2008) didn't start writing hymns until age 50. *Go, My Children* came about when he was asked to write a text to go with the Welsh tune AR HYD Y NOS. He said this about it: "To set it apart from other versifications of the Benediction, I placed the words of the hymn into the mouth of the blessing triune God dismissing the congregation after worship while drawing together a review of the events that transpired during the service."
